IBC-M Entry Exam Info Sheet

The IBC-M Entry Exam is composed of three main parts:

- 1. The English section,
- 2. The Math section, and
- 3. The Interview.

The English section is used to test your English skills, in aspects such as, grammar, vocabulary, syntax, writing and spelling. This section is divided into smaller parts that test the before mentioned aspects. Additionally, the English Section requires you to write an essay. There you will be given a task and you will have to write about 200 words based on the information provided. The English section contains 55 questions and 1 essay.

The Math section is also divided into smaller parts, where each part will test your knowledge in a different way. These aspects mostly include simple aspects of math, such as, decimals, fractions, probabilities, graphs, simple equations, small physical scenarios, and others. The purpose of the math section is to test the ability of the student's numerical reasoning and logic. There is a total of 12 problems to be solved in the Math section, and most sections also include sub-questions.

The Interview is a face to face dialogue with an IBC-M staff member who typically is a native English speaker. The IBC-M Interviews usually last between 10 to 15 minutes and test your verbal English abilities, on aspects such as, pronunciation, logical use of language, and so on. The Interviews is also using to identify your relevance to IBC-M and its programmes, and qualitative feedback is provided by the interviewer of IBC-M in this regard for each individual potential student.

The entry exam scoring structure is as follows:

- 1. Written Exam (Written English + Written Math) = 65% of overall score.
- 2. Interview = 35% of overall score.
